Forsyth County Sheriff's Office

JAIL BUREAU

The Jail Bureau is comprised of both the Security Division, and the Operations Division. The Bureau also has a Grievance Deputy who reports directly to the Jail Commander and serves as a non-partial representative to handle inmates' grievances regarding jail staff, contractors, or other inmates.



SECURITY DIVISION

The Jail's Security Division consists of four watches, each working 12-hour shifts. Each watch consists of approximately twenty-two employees, including the direct line supervision of sixteen Deputies and three Inmate Service Specialist's by a Lieutenant, Sergeant, and Corporal.

The Security Division has many roles within the jail; however, the most critical is managing all inmate housing areas. There are fourteen inmate housing areas, as well as an Infirmary. The Infirmary sees and treats inmates with medical issues, mental health issues, and suicide watches. Flex Housing is utilized for discipline issues, and housing the administrative segregation population consisting of individuals with mental health issues, those in protective custody, or the high profile.

All arrestees in the Forsyth County jurisdiction and geographic area are brought to the detention center for intake. The arrestees may be brought in by the Sheriff's Office, City Police, Department of Natural Resources, Georgia Bureau of Investigations, Corp of Engineers, or Georgia State Patrol. The Security Division is responsible for fingerprinting, photographing, and confirming the identification of all intakes.

After an inmate is processed through booking, it is the responsibility of the deputies in this Security Division to ensure the safety, security, medical, and dietary needs of each inmate are met. Inmates are issued a tablet with the Inmate Handbook on it, and must acknowledge that they have read and understand the handbook in order to move forward with using the various programs on it, and the kiosk in the housing unit; however, it is the Security Division that ensures compliance and addresses any violations.



Briefly, other essential functions of the Security Division include:

- Jail Deputy training
- Manage Inmates working in the kitchen
- Inmate movement (court appearances, visitation, evaluator meetings, etc.)
- · Random & scheduled contraband searches
- Nightly security sweeps inside & outside the courthouse
- Inmate booking & classification
- Inmate background checks
- Inmate property custodians

The Special Response Unit (SRU) is a team within the jail's Security Division trained to handle riots, unruly inmates, mass movements of inmates from one location to another, large-scale shakedowns, and hostage situations.

OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Jail's Operations Division has several areas with many responsibilities. These areas include Administrative, Communications, Resources, Grass Detail, Litter Detail, Transportation, and Programs. The Jail's Operations Division consists of twelve Civilians, two Corporals, four Transport Deputies, three Jail Resource Deputies, one Grass Detail Deputy and one Litter Detail Deputy. One Lieutenant and one Sergeant are the direct line supervision for Operations.

The essential functions of the Operations Division include:

- Documentation and records
- Bonding processes and records
- Inmate court files
- Security control and communications
- Inmate transportation; on and off-site
- Inmate release
- Jail sanitation and maintenance
- Inmate laundry
- Kitchen security
- Support and supplies for facility
- Supervision of inmate workers who cut grass, pick up litter, and move equipment for the entire Sheriff's Office, Georgia State Patrol, and National Guard.

Another function of the Operations Division is the Programs Unit. This unit provides the service of a law library, and a notary for the inmates. It also coordinates several activities and beneficial programs for inmates housed in the jail. Through partnerships with a significant number of community volunteers, we are able to provide the following programs to our inmates:

- GED training and testing (through Lanier Tech)
- Continued high school education (through Forsyth County Board of Education)
- Church Ministry
- Alcoholics Anonymous
- Narcotics Anonymous
- Transition Classes; including anger management, parenting skills, budgeting and managing money, listening skills, and interviewing techniques

Some of these programs were suspended in March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Jail Operations Bureau is eager to commence these programs again in the future when feasible.

The Forsyth County Jail is a smoke-free environment. This means that no smoking of any substance, including any type of tobacco or vaping product, will be allowed. Smoking items that are brought into the Jail by the arrestee will be held with their personal property. Any of these items brought to the Jail for inmates will not be accepted and any items mailed to the Jail for inmates will not be returned. Contraband items are destroyed when discovered by Jail staff.

Class Training

Transition Classes including Anger Management, Parenting Skills, Budgeting & Money Management, Listening Skills, Interviewing Techniques, How to Get a Job, 5 Lies That Ruin Relationships, How to Change For The Better, Becoming an R12 (Romans 12) Person, The Place of Forsyth Project, etc.



Church Services are available throughout the week. We currently have five denominations represented with over 120 volunteers.

The Litter Detail Deputy coordinates with Forsyth County Clean and Beautiful for road clean up, establishing which areas and roads within Forsyth County have been reported as needing clean up. The Deputy supervises four inmates who perform county roadside trash removal.

After its inception in mid-2018, 855 bags of trash were collected and 88 roads were maintained in the first six months.

Flip Your Script

We offer select inmates the opportunity to participate in our Pups with Purpose jail dog training program. This program partners inmates with rescued dogs from the animal shelter. Inmates are given an opportunity to provide care and obedience training to these homeless dogs during a 12-week class before the dogs are adopted out to citizens. This program enhances inmates' social and vocational skills while giving unwanted dogs a second chance. To learn more please visit the Pups with Purpose website.

FCSO offers the RSAT program, along with our community partners, in hopes of providing these men and women the opportunity to become healthier, productive members of our community once released from the jail.

AGENCY POLICY & ACCREDITATION

Accreditation of Law Enforcement agencies helps to ensure accountability and transparency which enhances confidence and trust in law enforcement among the communities they serve. Law Enforcement accreditation is a self-initiated process wherein standardized policies, procedures and practices are developed under the guidance of industry tested and proven standards, commonly referred to as 'best practices'.




To obtain accreditation, Law Enforcement agencies must complete a 'self-assessment' process to assure policies and practices comply with the standards of the accrediting agency. Next, a team of assessors who are seasoned law enforcement veterans visit the agency and conduct an on-site assessment which consist of policy preview, interviews with agency personnel, analysis of high liability issues, ride-alongs with deputies and interviews with citizens of the community. The on-site assessment determines adherence to applicable standards and the award of accreditation. Accredited agencies must then maintain annual compliance during the accreditation period, which is four (4) years.

Since being elected Sheriff in 2016, Sheriff Freeman has made Accreditation a priority. Upon taking office, he immediately

implemented the Accreditation Unit & asked it with obtaining CALEA Accreditation. On November 18, 2017, within eleven (11) months of taking office, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office was awarded LE1 Accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA).

Seeking to achieve the highest level of accreditation available, Sheriff Freeman pursued Advanced CALEA Accreditation. This goal was quickly achieved when on May 4, 2019, an award of Advanced CALEA Accreditation was presented to Sheriff Freeman. After successfully completing four (4) annual CALEA Assessments, including an on-site assessment in March of 2023, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office was awarded another four (4) year term of CALEA Advanced Accreditation on May 4, 2023.

The Sheriff's Office also maintains Law Enforcement Certification by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police (GACP). On August 24, 2023, the Sheriff Office successfully completed Year 1 of a four year State Law Enforcement Certification by showing continued compliance with all applicable standards.





FORSYTH COUNTY JAIL ACCREDITATION


The Forsyth County Jail was awarded Level 1 accreditation by the National Institute for Jail Operations (NIJO) in August of 2022. This accreditation assures compliance with constitutional requirements for jail operations as well as compliance with applicable state laws and other best practices. In August of 2023, the Forsyth County Jail was recognized for maintaining the highest level of NIJO accreditation for two consecutive years.

Continuation of the various Law Enforcement and Jail accreditations is made possible by the resolute and professional members of the Sheriff's Office. Conducting the annual self-assessments provides an avenue for personnel to be involved in policy review as well as statistical and analytical reviews of various high liability topics. This process educates, trains and maintains the highest level of professionalism in agency personnel.



Welcome to your 2023 FCSO Annual Report. Serving as your Sheriff is an incredible honor. I, along with the men and women of the FCSO, take keeping you and your family safe as our priority #1.

2024 is going to be an exciting year for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. We entered the year with significant improvements in our staffing. This gives us the opportunity to select only the best to serve the citizens of Forsyth County. While most agencies have dozens if not hundreds of vacant positions, FCSO currently has only 9 openings with over 50 current applicants as I write this.



In 2023, we accomplished so much, we made major inroads into taking down an international theft ring that had been operating with near impunity across nearly half of the United States. It was FCSO that took many of these criminals down. After their prison stays, many will be deported from the U.S. We took over a dozen child predators off the street in Operation Masquerade, where FCSO targeted those who would harm our children. We also targeted those dealing in deadly fentanyl drugs and ended a burglary ring targeting jewelers across the Metro.

One of our major objectives for FY 24-25 is to stand up a Real Time/Fusion Crime Center (RTCC). A RTCC is a centralized location, with specially trained crime analysts, that utilize various systems and technologies. These technologies consists of video and databases to analyze data, often in real time, and provide information to our Deputies even as they respond to 911 calls. The core function of a RTCC is data gathering, analysis, and sharing information to aid in decision making and response coordination. Unlike traditional policing, which is very reactive in nature, RTCCs take a more proactive approach and are helping law enforcement agencies do more with less. This is extremely important, given the increased need to be more strategic & efficient with the resources we have, as Forsyth County continues to grow and unbridled crime from metro-Atlanta reaches out to communities like ours.

The great news for our citizens is that Forsyth County continues to have the lowest crime rates in the Metro-Atlanta region. I often hear that crime is rising with the growth of Forsyth. Make no mistake, that growth brings additional challenges and needs, but crime is down in Forsyth and lower in most categories than we experienced even a decade ago with a significantly smaller population. We can attribute that to the partnership our citizens have with FCSO and the incredible work the Deputies and staff do every day to keep Forsyth safe. It will not stay that way if we take our eye off the ball or fall short on being both staffed and innovative in our approach to stay ahead of crime trends. Even in Forsyth, we battle international theft rings and organized criminal elements from around the world. They are learning quickly that FCSO doesn't play, and Forsyth is where many of them currently find themselves in jail without bond.

Serving the community I have called home for nearly 45 years is an incredible privilege. You have my commitment that we will not rest and will do what is needed to keep Forsyth the place you want to live, play, and raise a family.

Sheriff Freeman is well versed in all operations of the agency and has served in nearly every command. He entered his second term as Sheriff in 2021. Sheriff Freeman's family has a long history in Georgia law enforcement. His father, a former police office in Savannah and a Deputy in Screven County, and two uncles, one who served as Chief of the Chatham County Police and later Chatham County Sheriff's Office. Together they have more than 130 years of service to the citizens of Georgia.

Sheriff Freeman, as all Georgia Sheriffs, is a constitutional officer and works directly for the residents of Forsyth County and not for any other Government entity. He answers directly to the citizens of Forsyth County. The Georgia Constitution mandates that Sheriffs oversee the jail, keep the security of the courts and serve the court's papers, and is to provide general law enforcement for the county. In 2022, Sheriff Freeman was elected by his fellow Sheriffs to serve on the Executive Board of the Georgia Sheriff's Association. He will become President of the Georgia Sheriff's Association in 2025.

Sheriff Freeman has been a resident of Forsyth County for more than forty years. He graduated from Forsyth County High School in 1987. He married his high school sweetheart, Dana, and they have two adult children whom both graduated from North Forsyth High School.

Sheriff Freeman holds an Associates Degree in Criminal Justice from Gainesville College, a Bachelor's Degree in Organizational Leadership from Reinhardt University and a Master of Public Administration from the University of Phoenix.

LAW ENFORCEMENT BUREAU

The Law Enforcement Bureau is a significant component of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office & includes the Patrol Division (North & South), Criminal Investigations Division (CID), & Special Operations Division. Law Enforcement consists of the prevention, detection, & investigation of crimes and the apprehension of suspect violators of the law.

Many specialized units fall within this bureau, including JCaF Drug Task Force, School Resource, SWAT, Traffic, & more.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is comprised of investigative units whose primary responsibility is to investigate and follow-up on crimes committed against persons or property in Forsyth County. The Major Crimes Unit, Hi-Tech Crimes Unit, Property Crimes Unit, Narcotics Unit, SWAT & Crisis Negotiation Teams, Warrant Unit, Peer Support Team, and Financial Crimes all fall under the Criminal Investigations Division.

MAJOR CRIMES

The Major Crimes Unit of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office is responsible for investigating all major crimes within Forsyth County, except for property crimes. Investigators within the Major Crimes Unit are tasked with providing follow-up investigations on cases where a major crime has been committed but no arrest has been made, as well as initiating new cases independently. Cases involving violent acts or death, sexual assault, threats, etc., are classified as major crimes.

PROPERTY CRIMES

Property Crime Detectives of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office are assigned to investigate and respond to calls and crime trends that need follow-up by a trained investigator. Crimes investigated include, but are not limited to, burglaries, thefts (personal property and financial), auto theft, entering autos, theft of trailers, and large construction equipment.



CRIME SCENE

The Crime Scene Investigation (CSI) Unit is responsible for collecting, preserving, and analyzing evidence for all criminal investigations at FCSO. The Crime Scene Unit collectively holds hundreds of hours in advanced training and multiple State Certifications.

In 2033, the CSI Unit examined 440 pieces of evidence, and responded to 199 scenes.

WARRANT UNIT

The Warrant Unit is responsible for locating and apprehending fugitives from justice. Warrant deputies work closely with Forsyth County prosecutors and courts as well other local, State, and Federal Agencies. Our Warrant Unit consists of one civilian employee, four Deputy First Class deputies, one Master Deputy, and one Sergeant that oversees daily operations. In addition, a deputy from this unit is assigned to the U.S. Marshals Services Fugitive Task Force.



NARCOTICS

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Unit is responsible for finding and investigating illegal narcotics use and distribution, as well as gambling, prostitution, and human trafficking within Forsyth County. This unit works hand-in-hand with the Major Crimes Unit.

These detectives are assigned county-wide and work wherever they find these illegal activities (listed above). With deputies assigned to the FBI task force and US Marshals office, our Narcotics Unit investigations often expand well beyond Forsyth County lines.



HI-TECH CRIMES

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Hi-Tech Crimes Unit investigates, tracks, and apprehends individuals involved in and participating in cyber-related crimes; including identity theft/white-collar crime, unauthorized computer access, cyberstalking, online child enticements and exploitation, the possession, distribution, and manufacturing of child pornography, and much more.

The Hi-Tech Crimes Unit is comprised of the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC), Hi-Tech Crimes, Sex Offender Registry, and Crime Scene. ICAC Detectives work to safeguard children from sexual predators by investigating crimes involving child exploitation on the internet and track those involved with child pornography. Hi-Tech Crimes Detectives investigate the many other cyber-related crimes. The Hi-Tech Crimes investigative teams also conduct forensic examinations of cell phones, computers, and other types of digital media seized in investigations.

White Collar Crimes fall under this unit as well. White-collar investigations include the theft of credit and debit cards used in a fraudulent manner and forgery of any kind, whether it is documents, checks, or unlawful signing of a name without one's permission.

VICTIM ADVOCATES

It has always been the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office's policy to offer assistance to victims of crimes when responding to a call. However, sometimes deputies have other calls to which they must immediately respond and cannot devote the time that the victim needs. Therefore our Victim Advocates assist victims of crime through the criminal justice system. Further, we know from first-hand experience that victimization does not end with the mere filing of a report to law enforcement, so Victim Advocates offer assistance throughout the criminal process.

In 2023, our Victim Advocates made contact with 692 victims, conducted 11 Forensic Interviews, assisted with 160 *TPOs, and had 498 follow-ups.

UNIFORM PATROL DIVISION

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Uniform Patrol Division (UPD) is comprised of the North Precinct, South Precinct, Crime Reduction Unit (CRU), K9 Unit, and Power-Shifts. The Uniform Patrol Division as a whole is responsible for providing uniformed deputies to manage and respond to calls for service, crime prevention, and maintain order.

CRIME REDUCTION UNIT

The Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) was created to provide intelligence driven proactive criminal enforcement throughout Forsyth County. CRU includes both uniformed deputies and K9 deputies with a variety of training and experience. The unit's primary function is to target patternable crimes such as burglaries, entering / theft from autos, and stolen vehicles. CRU is a force multiplier for the Uniform Patrol Division and provides a quick response of additional resources and manpower for critical incidents.

K9 UNIT (Canine)


The K9 Teams' primary responsibilities are tracking lost and/or missing persons, tracking suspects engaged in criminal activity, evidence & lost property recovery, assisting with high-risk warrant service, detecting explosives, and detecting narcotics. The K9 Unit works throughout the county & also assists other agencies as needed/requested. The K9 Unit keeps a constant training schedule to maintain an elite level of skill.

The FCSO K9 Unit consists of six K9/deputy teams:

- 2 K9 Teams Patrol Certified (detection, tracking, apprehension)
- 1 K9 Team Bloodhound with expert tracking skills
- 1 K9 Team Explosives Detection
- 2 K9 Teams Detection, tracking, & SRO Unit

POWER SHIFTS

Power-Shifts are a group of Deputies split into 2 teams that work to support the Uniform Patrol Division during high call-volume periods and evening shift-change time periods. The Power-Shifts follow crime trends, conduct directed and extra patrol requests, work traffic complaints, handle special detail requests, and assist the Uniform Patrol Division with critical incidents.







Priority 1: Respond immediately, emergency equipment, lights & sirens. Priority 2: Respond immediately, under normal traffic conditions.


Priority 3: Respond once all priority 1 and 2 calls are handled.

10 YEAR CRIME COMPARISON (FORSYTH COUNTY ONLY)





SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Special Operations Division consists of the School Resource Officer (SRO) Unit, Volunteer Unit, Seasonal Patrols, Crisis Intervention Response Team, Traffic Specialist Unit, and the Traffic Enforcement Section.

TRAFFIC SPECIALIST UNIT

The Traffic Specialist Unit consists of a specially trained team that investigates serious injury & fatal traffic crashes, as well as hit & run incidents in Forsyth County. Traffic Specialist Deputies are equipped with numerous state-of-theart pieces of equipment, including the Total Station System, which is used to map a crash or crime scene to scale, a Bosch Crash Data Retrieval System that retrieves crash data from an airbag


module, and other critical investigative software and hardware. Most of this equipment was purchased using drug seizure funds at no cost to taxpayers.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT SECTION

The Traffic Enforcement Section is responsible for keeping the roads safe and consists of the Traffic Unit, H.E.A.T. Unit and D.U.I. Task Force, the Motors Unit, the Traffic Specialist Unit, and a Traffic Response Vehicle.

H.E.A.T. UNIT

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office is proud of its continued partnership with the Georgia Governor's Office of Highway Safety (G.O.H.S.). In 2023, we renewed our H.E.A.T. Unit program beginning October 2023, and received a grant from the Governor's Office for our enforcement and educational efforts.

The mission statement for the H.E.A.T. members is to reduce accidents, fatalities, and serious injuries through education and enforcement. The H.E.A.T. Unit members aggressively target unsafe driving behavior in the areas of D.U.I., speeding, occupant protection, and distracted driving.

Not only do the H.E.A.T. members aggressively target unsafe driving violators, but they also spend time on educational efforts. The H.E.A.T. members are commonly requested to teach at schools, businesses, and community events to educate the public about Traffic Safety issues.

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office also has a D.U.I. Unit that essentially has the same goals and responsibilities as a H.E.A.T. member, just not attached to the grant. The H.E.A.T. and D.U.I. members work side by side to combat unsafe driving behavior. For 10 months during 2023 the DUI unit consisted of six sworn deputies allowing for the same amount of enforcement while the H.E.A.T Grant was being renewed.

The above citation totals include all citations issued by FCSO. Not all offenses are illustrated in graph. Citation numbers were obtained in March 2024 from RMS.

MOTORS UNIT

The Motor Unit, which grew to six 2022, tasked with deputies in is aggressive traffic enforcement, targeting high traffic crash areas and complaints from citizens of traffic issues. The Motor Unit also oversees deploying "Speed Smart Trailers" and TraxxPro devices. These devices help the agency target dates and times to best focus on speed enforcement and educate the public on speeding issues. The Motor Unit is also responsible for funeral escorts and other special assignments.



TRAFFIC RESPONSE VEHICLE

The Traffic Response Vehicle (TRV), much like the Georgia Department of Transportation's HERO truck, is designed to help residents with roadside problems. However, the FCSO Traffic Response Vehicle also enforces laws and issues citations as needed. The TRV Unit patrols high-traffic county roads and provides roadside help during busy

CRISIS INTERVENTION RESPONSE TEAM

The Crisis Intervention Response Team (CIRT) is a grant-funded special unit created by a partnership between the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office and Avita Community Partners. The unit's primary goals are to provide a co-response to citizens experiencing a mental health-related crisis, encourage connections between mental health consumers and local resource providers, and reduce the prevalence of mental illness in the Detention Center. The unit is funded in part by a grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance's Justice and Mental Health Collaborative Program. The CIRT seeks to accomplish its goals by employing both reactive and proactive methods.

In 2023, our CIRT Unit expanded with the addition of a second co-responder. Now, four members make up our CIRT Unit, led by Sgt. Terry Hawkins, a twenty-year veteran of FCSO, who has had advanced training for the position through courses such as the GPSTC Crisis Intervention Team course, Mental Health First Aid, and many others. Avita provides the two other licensed Clinical Social Workers, who serve as clinicians on their respective co-response teams.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER UNIT

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office School Resource Officer Unit is committed to working closely with the Forsyth County Board of Education and School Safety Department to maximize the safety of our most valuable treasure, our youth. Sheriff Freeman and the Board of Education have developed a plan to staff a minimum of one SRO at each public school campus in Forsyth County. Our School Resource Officers protect nearly 54,000 students and more than 8,000 school staff within 42 school campuses & 7 support facilities. The SRO deputies

provide direct services to the schools, including campus safety inspections, classroom presentations, criminal investigations, student and parent conferences, and a variety of other activities, including traditional law enforcement duties and security.

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office School Safety Task Force trains annually for active shooter situations, bomb threats, and other school threat scenarios. In 2023, six dedicated School Threat Investigations Teams were created within the unit that have the capability to respond to any potential threats made to our schools 24/7. Deputies are given full access to school campuses and all of the resources they need to keep our youth safe, and on the path to become our next successful generation.

SHERIFF SERVICES BUREAU

The Sheriff's Services Bureau provides services to the community for which the Office of the Sheriff is constitutionally responsible and provides administrative and logistical support to the agency. The Bureau is comprised of three divisions: Judicial Operations, Training, and Headquarters, as well as the Policy and Accreditation function.



JUDICIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Judicial Operations Division is responsible for the constitutional duties of Judicial Security and Enforcement. Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Court Security Deputies are responsible for providing a safe atmosphere within the Forsyth County Court, including but not limited to, Superior and State Courts, Grand Jury, Juvenile Court, Probate, and Magistrate Court.

JUDICIAL ENFORCEMENT SECTION

The Judicial Enforcement Section consists of the Civil Unit and the Ordinance and Permits Unit.

The Civil Unit provides personal service of official court papers such as summonses, civil complaints, protection orders, and other documents pertaining to legal proceedings. The Civil Unit also facilitates activities like evictions, property pick-ups, and court-ordered seizures.

The Ordinance and Permits Unit enforces certain county ordinances, with an emphasis on quality of life and safety concerns. Areas of focus include the sale of alcohol, vape and non-traditional tobacco products, and spa and massage businesses. In 2023, the Ordinance and Permits Unit conducted 19 massage parlors, 203 alcohol and 25 vape compliance checks.

The unit also provides fingerprint and criminal history services for Forsyth County residents and businesses for various purposes such as employment, adoption, firearms licenses, and alcohol permits. The Permit Office is open to the public, generally by appointment.



JUDICIAL SECURITY SECTION

The Judicial Security Section performs multiple functions for Forsyth County and its citizens. The utmost responsibility is to provide safety and security for all staff and visitors at numerous county buildings. These buildings are the main courthouse, three satellite courts, the Tax Commissioner's two offices and the County Administration building. Judicial services also work in other county buildings. The judicial services deputies also assist with tours of the main courthouse, these tours include students from our local schools, cub scouts and we host the Trial Competitions annually. All deputies assigned to this unit train a multitude of hours in various scenarios, including courthouse active shooters, diversity training and numerous other topics that keep our deputies educated real-world environments prepared for and situations.

Deputies assigned to this Section are trained in courtroom security, access control, inmate movement, and emergency response, using a variety of tools and the latest technologies. This unit further assists in court procedures, both in person and performing video conferencing for the judge & courts when in person court is not available due to restrictions.

Judicial Security also monitors program compliance of Accountability Courts participants. This assignment is extremely valuable to the success of the Accountability Courts. The deputy assigned works directly with the programs by conducting home searches, interviews and assisting the coordinators of these programs with face-to-face monitoring of the participants involved. It brings a personal aspect and a trusting atmosphere to the programs.

JUVENILE JUSTICE CENTER

In September of 2022, the new Juvenile This Courthouse building opened. Courthouse is a three story secure building, encompassing 70,000 square feet. It houses two courtrooms, judges' chambers, three training rooms, multiple conference rooms, secured holding areas for both adult and juvenile detainees, counselling offices, court administration staff, the Assistant District Attorney's office, Clerk of Courts, secure parking for the judges, and an unfinished floor for future expansion. The parking lot was enlarged and can now hold 150+ vehicles, including six ADA parking spaces for the public.



QUARTERMASTER

Quartermaster is responsible for meeting the agency's uniform and equipment needs, including issuing duty gear, body armor, and uniforms for deputies, certain civilian employees, and other personnel equipment, except for weapons. In addition, Quartermaster also:

- Maintains a working inventory of approximately 150K items for an agency with nearly 500 employees.
- Issues and maintains equipment for vehicles such as fire extinguishers, AED's, and tire deflation devices.
- Works with manufacturers and dealers to evaluate and recommend reliable, cost-effective gear.

FLEET/LOGISTICS UNIT

The Fleet & Logistics Unit manages and maintains the Agencies 430+ vehicles to emergency vehicles' stringent standards. These responsibilities include:

- Maintain Fleet policy and vehicle specifications, procurement, safety measurements and maintenance schedules, registration/inspection protocols and records administration.
- Select vehicles appropriate to the operational needs of the department to maximize effectiveness and efficiency.
- Provide vehicles and coordinate emergency response equipment required to optimize the effectiveness of operations
- Investigate and resolve operational problems at the field and headquarters level.
- Maintain and oversee the Fleet decommissioning process as well as the Fleet spare vehicle motor pool.

RECORDS UNIT

The Records Unit is the official repository of incident reports, crash reports, citations, inmate records, and other Sheriff's Office activity documentation. The Unit is responsible for preserving and producing such records in compliance with applicable laws governing record retention and release.

GCIC UNIT

The GCIC Unit (Georgia Crime Information Center) is responsible for the entry, maintenance, retrieval, and control of all information that falls within the Georgia Crime Information Center's scope. Such information includes active arrest warrants, stolen item files, missing persons, and other law enforcement sensitive records. The Unit is also responsible for institutional and individual compliance with GCIC rules and State Law.

Property taken as evidence must be carefully safeguarded to prevent contamination and insure its value in court. An important function of this unit is the proper and timely disposal of property. This includes the return of property to its rightful owner, destruction, conversion, or auction of items as prescribed by law.


BUSINESS SERVICES SECTION

FINANCE UNIT

The Finance Unit is responsible for budgeting, financial analysis and reporting, purchasing and contract administration, inventory control, grant coordination and compliance, banking, accounting, Employee Benefits and payroll for the Sheriff's Office's nearly 500 9.7% employees.

For fiscal year 2022, FCSO's actual expenditures were \$54.8M versus a revised budget of \$55.6M, the Sheriff's Office ended 2022 approximately \$.8M under revised budget.

For fiscal year 2023, FCSO's actual expenditures were \$61.9M versus a revised budget of \$63M. The Sheriff's Office ended 2023 approximately \$1.1M under revised budget.



BACKGROUND & RECRUITMENT

The Backgrounds and Recruitment Unit is responsible for promoting careers with the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office in locations such as colleges, technical schools, military posts, and other events. The unit also processes all applications, conducts applicant background checks, coordinates preemployment testing and interviewing, and ultimately makes hiring recommendations to the Sheriff. FCSO has many career opportunities for jailers, certified law enforcement officers, and civilians.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY UNIT

Sheriff's Office Information Technology (SOIT) is responsible for evaluating, acquiring, supporting, and providing the security of the technology platforms that are crucial for day-to-day operations within the agency. This includes all items such as cell phones, laptops, in-car and body-worn cameras and all applications that are utilized by our staff. This includes dispatch software, records management, report writing, and countless specialized programs that allow our employees to complete their assigned duties.

We also conduct on-site physical agility tests of all sworn applicants. The Georgia Peace Officer Standards & Training (P.O.S.T.) council's Physical Agility Testing (P.A.T.) requirements.

Testing course description:

- The course measures a total of 870 feet (290 yards/265.2 meters half-court basketball court).
- There is a time limit of two minutes six seconds, which starts on candidates movement from the starting line, & ends when they pass the finish line.
- The course consists of a series of nine interspersed individual tasks, arranged in a continuous format that may be viewed as being essential (physical) job tasks for law enforcement training:
 - 1. Running
 - 2. Jumping (low hurdle)
 - 3. Climbing stairs
 - 4. Low crawling
 - 5. Jumping (broad-type)
 - 6. Climbing a fence (chain-link/four feet)
 - 7. Climbing through a window
 - 8. Moving/dragging a weight (150lbs)
 - 9. Changing direction on the run



Our on-site Polygraphist, Detective Joe Amnicki, conducts polygraphs for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office, which helps move the background & hiring processes along faster & more efficiently.

OPEN RECORDS

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office adheres to the Georgia Open Records Act, which states all public records are available for inspection & copying unless they are specifically exempted from disclosure under the law. The Open Records Unit responds to all public records requests from citizens, inmates, law firms, and other private entities. Public records provided by the Open Records Unit vary greatly. Public records range from initial incident reports, to body camera videos, to complete investigative files. Requested documents and files are only released in accordance with Georgia law or court orders. Public records requests can be submitted on our website, via mail/email, or in person.

In late November of 2023, the Open Records Unit began utilizing a new tracking software called JustFOIA. This new system has allowed the Open Records Unit to track, communicate, and fulfill public records requests electronically, while carefully protecting each citizen's information. Electronic records are much easier to access and are processed more efficiently for the citizens.

TRAINING DIVISION

The Training Division is dedicated to ensuring that Forsyth County deputies are knowledgeable, skilled, and well-prepared to meet the high expectations of the Sheriff and the community. Experienced instructors provide constant on-going training in tactics, firearms, driving, deescalation/negotiation, respond to mass casualty incidents, emergency medicine, and more.

In 2023 the Training Division conducted 38,572 hours of training for Sheriff's Office personnel and officers from outside agencies. Throughout the year, the Training Division scheduled and conducted 79 Certified in-service training days, twenty-six advanced and intermediate classes and

twelve classes for the Georgia Sheriff's Office. Additionally, the Training Division hosted classes for Standardized Field Sobriety and Field Training Officer, Precision Immobilization Technique (P.I.T.), and Taser 7.

In addition to the Certified in-service, the Training Division scheduled training that focused on Jail personnel. Jail training consisted of an additional three days of in-service training and hosting four Basic Jail Officer schools, which are eighty hours each. The Jail in-service is scheduled over a week at a time to ensure all personnel can participate. This encompasses an entire week for each of the in-services.

The Training Division continued to host firearms training at the Sheriff's Office range. Training consisted of skill building with rifles and sidearms, tactics

and qualifications. The Training Division was able to conduct several scenario-based training courses including judgmental situations throughout the year. This also included low-light training, allowing the

deputies to train at night.

Another first for the Training Division was hosting the inaugural North Georgia University Public Safety Academy-Forsyth. The Academy consisted of the Basic Law Enforcement Training course along with five weeks of advanced training. The first class graduated twenty-six officers from ten different agencies from North Georgia. The officers that started the Academy completed the training and graduated in 2023. In addition to graduating the first Academy Class, the Training

Division hosted Class 2 and Class 3 which began and graduated in 2023.

The newly created Physical Fitness Coordinator position was well received and had a successful second year. The coordinator was able to develop and schedule classes for the deputies and developed a year long competition for employees. This also included quarterly challenges that had high employee participation. This position is helping to create healthier and more physically fit deputies, which will provide a better service for the community.

Overall, 2023 was a very busy and successful year for the Training Division.



COMMUNITY RELATIONS



The Community Relations Unit is a vital component of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office, as they promote safety and education to Forsyth County citizens and businesses. They are responsible for coordinating and delivering special classes and programs to better the relationship between the community and the Sheriff's Office.

Along with the Community Relations Unit's many classes and programs, they also partner with other organizations throughout the year and attend many community events.

The Community Relations team was able to conduct/attend nearly 300 public relations events. They attended or participated in multiple Neighborhood Watch meetings, Career Days, Touch a Trucks, National Faith and Blue Weekend, four Halloween Trunk or Treats, the Cumming Christmas Parade, and more. They also organized various FCSO events. The Community Relations Unit also assisted with the Holiday House program, which served over 2,400 families. Lastly, they organized The The FCSO Holiday Hope Program, which included the preparation and delivery of a hot holiday meal, additional staple meals and comfort items to 300 at need senior citizens in the county.

It is also the responsibility of the unit to enter traffic complaints, security checks, and vacation checks submitted by citizens. In 2023, they completed 1,692 entries, 1001 vacation checks, 182 traffic complaints, and 509 extra patrol requests.

PROBLEM ORIENTED POLICING

The Problem-Oriented Policing (POP) Unit was developed to improve strategies that prevent and reduce crime. POP Deputies analyze crimes and problem areas within the community and search for effective solutions. Communication is critical for our POPs team, so they spend a lot of time out in the community talking with citizens and business owners in Forsyth County. The POP Unit also heads up the FCSO Business Watch program.

CLASSES & PROGRAMS

CLASSES

Women's Self Defense

Designed to teach women situational awareness by reviewing case studies of previous abductions. Some hands-on training is provided but is limited.

CRASE (Citizens Response to Active Shooter Event)

Intended to teach what to do/not do in the case of an active shooter. The skills taught are to Avoid, Deny and Defend-STAY ALIVE and Survive!

Stranger Danger

Educates and empowers children ages 4-11 with knowledge and skills that will help them be safer from various crimes against children.



PROGRAMS

SALT (Seniors and Lawmen Together)

Open to all Forsyth County Senior Citizens and held monthly. Each month features different speakers and different topics pertaining to senior safety.

CLEA (Citizens Law Enforcement Academy)

The program closely follows the actual handson training that deputies undergo. Topics include constitutional law, conducting traffic stops, judgmental use of force, K9 and S.W.A.T. Demonstrations, ride-along with deputies, and much more.

TIP (Teen Interception program)

TIP has the sole purpose of saving teen lives by redirecting them to make better choices and live successful lives. This seven-week program includes several vital speakers and trips to a funeral home, the Forsyth County Jail, and a homeless compound in Atlanta.



STOPPED (Sheriff's Telling Our Parents-Promoting Educated Drivers)

If, for any reason a vehicle is stopped by a deputy while being driven by a teen, a notification letter is sent to the registered owner of the vehicle (1495 notifications were sent out in 2023, 833 Citations and 662 Warnings).
